- 14. According to 83% of students the effect of the internal assessment on course grade help to improve and 11% of students it is discouraged.
- 15. According to 72% of students the teacher provides feedback on performance regularly and in time as well as 21% of students it is with helpful comment.
- 16. According to 72% of students the assignments are discussed and according to 25% of students it partly discussed.
- 17. According to 72% of students a course contributory lecture was provided at the beginning and it is 10% of students say no.
- 18. 90% of students have given good and positive remarks and comments to offer on the course and suggestions for the teacher.
